

## RALEIGH,

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 29, 1813.

Major General GEORGE GRAHAM, of Mecklenburg, with two hundred countymen under his command, have tendered their services to the General Government, through his Excellency Governor Hawkins, to march instantly against the hostile Creek Indians.—The present standing of General Graham as a man and an officer, and the eminent services rendered by him during our Revolutionary struggle are so well known that should his tender be accepted, North-Carolina will have confidence that her military fame will not be tarnished.—

We mention for the information of the rising generation, that during the revolutionary war, and at a time too when there appeared the greatest cause for desponding, the county of Mecklenburg presented a *solid phalanx of practical Patriots*.—During his stay in that county Lord Cornwallis found not a single disaffected or wavering man. This is the county in which Davie principally raised that corps which distinguished itself in the partizan war in South-Carolina, and in which the Standard of Independence was raised by the citizens thereof before it was declared by Congress.
