ABSTRACT

The United Confederate Veterans organization was founded in New Orleans, Louisiana, in 1889. It was created to unify the numerous separate Confederate veterans' groups, provide relief for veterans and their families, and erect monuments. Reunions were held each year in various southern locations, with the last held in Norfolk, Virginia, in 1951.

This collection includes artifacts, documents, newspaper clippings, and publications.
